I must also acquaint you, as it was natural expect, when, on a Angular Occasion of this Numbers of People from adjacent Towns and Country, came flocking to a Place that remarkable; that in such SO a promiscuous Multitude some Counterfeits would readily pen; it was the early Care of the Ministers whointerested themselves most in that Matter, to Examination of those who appeared into a strict be under a more than ordinary Concern, so to obtain Satisfaction to themselves, whether the Work was solid, being iustly apprehensive, That of Darkness would not fail to employ Powers their Devices* to bring Contempt on what might tend so much to the Honour of the Gospel.

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On Monday the 15th of February there General Meeting, at the Minister's House, of particular Societies for Prayer, which had subsisted in the Parish for several Years before: On Tuesday another Meeting for Prayer there, was Occasion of which was a Concert with several seri-Christians elsewhere, about solemn public Interests of the relating to the Gospel; which Concert only a small Number of People Cambuslang were engaged at first, but others getting Notice of it, desired to join, and were mitted: The People who met for Prayer days, apprehended that they had been so well employed, and found so much Leisure for it, that they had a third Meeting on Wednesday: But all these three Days they returned timeously in the Evening to their own Houses, so far is it from being true that they rushed from some of these Meetings the Church and continued immured to there for some Days and Nights, as was reported.

Before Thursday, February the 18th, they Week-day Sermons only on Thursdays according to the above-mentioned Desire of the Parish: Day. tho' particular before that several Persons came to the Minister, from Time to Time, under their Concern about Salvation, yet came no great Numbers together.

about fifty, came together to the Minister's House, under Convictions and alarming Apprehensions about the State of their Souls, and desiring to speak with him.

▼ Understand expected it is from me, that should declare my Sentiments of the extraordinary Work at Cambuslang, as good manv of my Parishioners have lately been awakened there, to a great Concern about their Souls piness.

As

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inform'd soon as I was of their Condition. I made it my Business to wait them, on a good many Persons under the deepest Exercise of Soul, crying bitterly, out most of lost and miserable Estate. by reason Sin. of their Unbelief. in despising Christ. and the Offers the Gospel, of the hardness of their Heart and their former gross Carelessness. Indifferency about And tho' Religion: they had regularly attended them said, the preaching of the Gospel, yet acknowledged with

much Regret, their Misimprovement of it; how many sweet Sermons they had heard without any Benefit, and they came to Church with no Design to be instructed, but only, as they said, To see, and be seen.

I have heard them expressing a deal of great for these Things, and seemingly, in the most serious and sincere Manner; and not much, as some of them have told me, from fear of Punishment, to which they had thereby exposed themselves, as from a Sense of the honour they had done to God. and the blessed Redeemer: and frequently aggravated their from this Consideration, That they had been Betrayers and Murtherers of the Lord of Glory,

And tho' I have seen some of them under extreme Affliction and Distress, I could never observe the least Disorder in their Judgments: But

their

25 their Complaints were suitable alwavs to their Condition. Neither have I observed anv of them carried away with despairing Thoughts of the Mercy of God: But all of them seemed to seeking Relief, in the Method the Gospel expressed the warmest Desires after and Interest in Christ, to obtain which they laid would cheerfully lay down their Lives, and part with every thing, that was dear to them in World.

Ι have at several different Times converted with many of these Persons, and have small Satisfaction from such no Conversations. of Prayer, they have speaking how much that Duty had been neglected by them, and in what a cold lifeless Manner it was

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They express a great Love to, and Desire after public Ordinances; when Ι have asked some of them, if they had such affection as Psalmist speaks of in the Beginning of 122 Psalm, when it was said to him, Let us go up to the House of the Lord, they have told me, that tho' it was quite otherwise with them before; yet now Pleasure in attending the vast Church. public Worship of God, and great Una willingness in them to withdraw from it. when the Service was over.

So far as I have yet Access to know them, they seem to be of a meek and quiet Spirit, forgive; telling me they Desire to and willing to wish well, and to pray even for the Happiness of those, who had been injurious to them.

More might be said upon this Subject, but I choose rather to be sparing, 'till Time make a clearer Discovery of them.

The Persons I have conversed with, were of different Characters: Some of them had all

along been pretty sober and regular in their Lives, and duly enough attended the Ordinances

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of the Gospel, others of them were very careless Way. and addicted to many Sins: But those who were more blameless their Lives. in have declared. That their Hearts 'till how. were touched with any Thing they heard from Word of God; that they had never lived under the Influence of Religion, and were grossly unconcern'd about their Salvation.

These are the Appearances, I observe of my People, who among some were awaken'd about their Souls Concern at Cambuslang; which do strongly incline me to think, that it the Work of God.
